## Ling 2010Q: The Science of Linguistics

Course Description: Humans alone weild the power of language: the power to express complex ideas and desires; the power to create and understand an infinite number of never-before-uttered sentences; the power from birth to master, flawlessly, an incredibly intricate grammatical system.

So what is language? What are the different components of language? How do children learn language? Which properties (if any) underlie all human languages? These are the questions that linguists ask, and the questions that we will explore in this course.

We will take a whirlwind tour through the formal, structural properties that we find across the world's languages—phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, and semantics.

You will each choose a language, which will be yours for the semester. Throughout the course you will apply the general concepts we are discussing in class to better understand that language, and you will periodically share your findings with the class in short presentations.

**Lecture:** Class lectures will be <u>based on handouts</u>, which I will print for you each class, and which you should bring to all following lectures. These handouts will also be posted on the course website, after each class.

You are expected to complete the assigned reading by the day of lecture.

Participation in lecture and regular attendance is expected.

**Homework:** Homework assignments will be posted on the course website on the dates listed in the schedule, and will be due on the dates listed in the schedule <u>by the beginning of class</u> (to me, by email, or to my mailbox in OAK 368).

Late assignments will not be accepted unless there is a documented and legitimate excuse.

Students are encouraged to work together on homework, but must turn in their own writeups. You should not have the exact same answer as somebody else. This will be considered plagiarism and university policies on dealing with plagiarism will apply.

Write-ups must be <u>legible</u> – it doesn't matter if it is done in pen, in pencil, or on the computer, but if I can't read it, I can't grade it. If you know you have extremely messy handwriting, please type!

Language Presentations: Throughout the semester there will be four occasions on which you will present ver briefly on findings from the language you have chosen as your focus language for the semester. These presentations will be accompanied by short writeups, which you should hand in to me at the time of the presentation, or email me beforehand. If you will be absent on one of the presentation days (noted in the syllabus), please make arrangements with me beforehand, and as soon as possible.

Midterm Exam: There will be a midterm exam on Thursday October 20th, which will mostly consist of short answer questions and cover just a portion of the course material.

You may reschedule the midterm exam only if you have a documented and legitimate excuse. Please let me know as soon as possible if this is the case.

**Final Exam:** The final exam will consist mostly of short answer questions and will be <u>cumulative</u>, i.e., it will cover all of the course material. However, there will be slightly more weight on the post-midterm part of the course (syntax and semantics).

The final exam will take place during exam week (December 12–18).

If you need to reschedule the final exam, you must do so through the Office of Student Services and Advocacy.

**General Notes:** This is a Q course, which means that we will be relying heavily on primary data, analysis, hypothesis-testing, and formalisms.

I will give small (ungraded) quizzes every class, to get you to practice what we have just learned. These will be used to help me gauge how everyone is doing, and to see who has attended the class.
